Montessori education begins with what children can see and touch before abstract concepts and ideas are introduced; this creates a strong, solid foundation from which children can set their imaginations afloat.

Montessorians maintain that while young children master their environments, they develop intelligence, a sense of self, and their unique personality, which in turn helps establish the natural ability of creative thinking.

In most Montessori classrooms you are not likely to

The ultimate objective of Montessori guides is to help their students learn independently and strengthen the curiosity, creativity and intelligence they possess innately. Montessori classrooms foster self-directed, spontaneous activity which require a level of order, concentration, independence and competence, resulting in the capacity for divergent thinking, problem solving and innovation.

Maria Montessori said, "The sensory education which prepares for the accurate perception of all the differential details in the qualities of things, is therefore the foundation of the observation of things... it helps us to collect from the external world the material for the imagination."
