Montessori Tidbit

As we return to school after winter break, this is a perfect time to revisit the idea of normalization. Normalization does not relate to "normal" in the sense we most frequently use the word, rather, it is an anthropological term referring to becoming a contributing member of society. In a Montessori classroom this refers to the process of children learning to focus and concentrate for sustained periods of time and taking enjoyment in learning and personal achievement. Children who are normalized are able to concentrate and make constructive work choices while working freely in the environment. They are peaceful and patient and exhibit self-control and self-discipline. Children who do not yet show these habits are at a different developmental stage and will need reminders and modeling to assist them as they grow.

Maria Montessori described normalization as, "the most important single result of our whole work." She named four characteristics that children who are normalized display; they are a love of work, concentration, self-discipline, and sociability. The child's love of work includes the ability to find joy and peace in work and making appropriately challenging work choices. Concentration develops as children utilize Montessori materials and become able to focus for longer periods of time. Perseverance and determination to carry through with challenges are an indicator of the child who has developed self-discipline. Sociability is evident when a child respects others' choices, their work, and recognizes their own responsibility to the class community. Let us all reflect on the important role normalization plays in Montessori education.
