Montessori Tidbit

Montessori classrooms have at their foundation the ideas of liberty and discipline. Liberty is also referred to as freedom, which is the ability for children to make certain choices about their work. This liberty goes hand in hand with responsibility and can be hard for some children to handle initially. A child has the ability to choose from many available works, focus and concentrate on the work and learn from it. However, children also have the responsibility to not infringe on another child's liberty to choose, focus and learn.

When children do infringe on others' liberty, it is a teacher's duty to assist the child in addressing their behavior. This often begins with a question about how the child is impacting others in the environment, allowing the child to reflect on consequences of their behavior. Some children are concerned with the impact they have on the class community and are able to monitor and change their behavior with just an occasional reminder. Other children have not yet developed self control and are not ready to be self aware. The teacher needs to aid these children in creating more focused and directed consequences which are natural, logical and consistent. In this way, the self discipline that children develop over time is complemented by external discipline that ensures the environment can be conducive for all children. Maria Montessori said, "It is clear therefore that the discipline which reveals itself in the Montessori class is something

which comes more from within than without. But this self-discipline has not come into existence in a day, or a week, or even a month. It is the result of a long inner growth, an achievement won through months of training." (The Absorbent Mind).
